### 2023-2024 Mock Trial Report Prepared for the Alamance Community College Board of Trustees February 11, 2024 Dr. Kevin Sargent

### What is Mock Trial?

- Mock Trial is a premiere co-curricular learning program for undergraduate students sponsored by the American Mock Trial Association (AMTA) headquartered in Des Moines, Iowa
- The goal of mock trial is to enhance student's critical thinking abilities, communication skills, teamwork, and professionalism
- Students who compete in mock trial play the roles of attorneys and witnesses in a simulated criminal or civil legal case that is released at the beginning of each year
- During the fall semester mock trial teams have the opportunity to compete in invitational tournaments hosted by individual schools around the country
- In the spring teams compete in 32 regional competitions to earn bids to the national championship tournament
- According to AMTA over 400 colleges and universities, 700 teams, and more than 7,300 individual students competed in mock trial this year

### Mock Trial and Community Colleges

- Traditionally, community colleges participation in mock trial has been very limited
- In the nine years Alamance Community College has competed, there have been only one or two other community college programs in the nation
- In 2023 AMTA announced a new initiative to expand community college participation called the "Community College Clash"
- AMTA hosted two online tournaments in October and December exclusively for community college students
- Only two schools participated in the October "Clash"--Pasadena Community College and Alamance-but Alamance was among ten teams from four schools that competed in the December event

### Mock Trial at Alamance

- The Alamance Mock Trial Team was founded in 2014 when students approached Dr.
   Sargent about starting a debate club at the college
- Mock Trial is open to all Alamance students and most years approximately 15-20 students participate to one degree or another
- Team members meet at least once a week from August through April, and much more frequently when preparing for competitions
- Since 2021, students have also had the opportunity to take COM 251: Debate 1 which uses the mock trial format to teach advocacy skills in a classroom setting

- The mock trial team is funded by the student activity fee administered by Student Support and the Student Government Association
- Dr. Sargent's work is supported by the Department of English, Communication and Humanities and the Business, Arts, and Sciences Division

- During the 2023-2024 season, Alamance teams competed in 10 full trials in three different competitions
- The team had only one returning member from 2022-2023
- October: Two trial/one day online "Clash" with Pasadena Community College

- December: Four trial/two day online "Clash" Championship

  - Zack Belchak: Outstanding Attorney Award

Action Item: Eastbound Interchange Exit 150 Beautification Project

### **Executive Summary**

ACC's eastbound exit has long been targeted for improvement and beautification. The College was approached several years ago, sparked by the development of the Biotechnology Center of Excellence, by New Leaf Society and NCDOT, to form a partnership to improve the visibility of the campus and provide a welcoming, landscaped pathway to exit the highway and enter the campus of Alamance Community College. New Leaf Society has agreed to assist the College with funding this endeavor.

The project will be split into two distinct phases. Phase One, funded by the College and completed with the guidance of NCDOT and New Leaf, will entail clearing over 1,000 linear feet of the eastbound exit hillside. This will open up the campus to the view of travelers on I-85/40 and will be completed during the current fiscal year.

Phase Two, to be completed in FY25 when planting is most advantageous, will include developing a landscape/planting plan and installing those plants. ACC Horticulture students, ACC Grounds staff, New Leaf staff and possibly NCDOT staff will all be involved in developing the final landscaping plan. Phase Two will be funded in part by New Leaf along with ACC funding. In addition, an agreement will be signed with NCDOT allowing ACC grounds maintenance access to cut and maintain the grasses along the slope of the exit.

Phase Two will be brought back to the Board of Trustees for approval once the design and final budget is developed. We expect ACC's investment in the overall Phase One and Phase Two to total approximately \$40,000.

**Action Item: Veterinary Medical Technician Instructional Barn Project** 

### **Executive Summary**

The second phase of development of the Bill & Nancy Covington Education Center will include the construction of an instructional barn with animal treatment areas for the College's new Veterinary Medical Technician program. The 1,600 square foot barn with 1,200 square foot loft will consist of both large animal and small animal treatment areas. There will be a vet teaching laboratory, office, feed/tack room, restroom facilities and animal housing (covered stalls and paddocks). The project will also include site improvements such as the addition of a driveway and parking, extension of the water and electric as well as the addition of a sewer/septic system for the facility.

The overall budget for the project is as follows:

Once approved by the Board of Trustees, the project will be submitted to the State Board for the approval of the use of State Capital Infrastructure Funds in the amount of \$250,000.

### Action:

College Administration requests establishing the Veterinary Medical Technician Instructional Barn Project as a new capital project with a total budget of \$1,250,000. Funding sources for the project are a \$1,000,000 grant from the Golden LEAF Foundation and \$250,000 State Capital Infrastructure Funds (SCIF).

Action Item: AATC Centralized Welding System Project

### **Executive Summary**

When the Advanced Applied Technology Center (AATC) was designed and constructed back in 2016/17, although the College was aware of the high demand for graduates of the welding program, it was not known that the program would consistently be running at capacity several sessions a day with enough demand to even begin a session overnight. This high use of the current decentralized work-station filtration and exhaust system has resulted in costly quarterly filter replacement adding up to over \$64,000 annually. In addition, the inability of the work-station exhaust to keep up with the welding outputs has caused additional costly repairs and additional wear and tear to the building HVAC system.

Originally, the building was designed to include a centralized filtration and exhaust system. This system was one of the items value engineered out of the project due to budget constraints at the time and the decision was made to install the current decentralized system. Three quotes were requested by the College with two vendors providing quotations. Air Cleaning Specialists provided the lowest quote at \$438,276. A/C Corporation provided the second quote at \$550,602. Southern Air was also contacted, but they failed to provide a quote.

The project has been submitted for consideration of a Cannon Grant at their March Board meeting. The request is for a \$280,000 grant leaving the College with the balance of \$168,276. It is the intent of the College, if the project is approved by the ACC Board, to request SCIF funding from the State for this additional cost. The overall budget and funding breakdown is as follows:

Action Item: Project Management Service Contract
Amendment to Service Agreement

### **Executive Summary**

In October of 2020, the Board of Trustees approved a Project Management service contract with Turner & Townsend Heery, LLC (formerly CBRE Heery, Inc.) as an hourly not to exceed fee structure totaling \$499,566 with a service term from October 2020 through December 2023. Funds for this service are paid out of County bond proceeds over all bond projects. Rob Ritter, the assigned Project Manager for ACC, has been instrumental in assisting the College serving as the "Owner's Representative" throughout the bond projects helping to minimize change orders, assist in the management of construction schedules and assist with best construction practices to deliver quality projects for the College.

Due to project schedules on the Public Safety Training Center and Main, Powell, Gee Renovation projects extending past the end of the initial contract, a contract amendment is required to continue these services. This contract amendment will be under the same terms as the original contract and same hourly rate with an effective date of January 1, 2024 terminating at the completion of the projects on July 31, 2025.

### Action:

College Administration requests approval of the Amendment to Service Agreement for Project Management Services with Turner & Townsend Heery, LLC effective January 1, 2024 through July 31, 2025 as an hourly not to exceed fee structure totaling \$105,000 to be funded out of County bond funds.

The State Construction Office has signed off and accepted the project as complete. The College will now work on close-out documentation and will bring to the Board for final project close-out prior to the end of the fiscal year.

Student Services Center

Resolute Builders has completed the corrections and replacements of problematic stair nosing on the monumental entrance stairs. They will complete the sealing of the stairs during spring break.

**Public Safety Training Center** 

**Green Level Site:** 

Samet has completed a majority of the site clearing on the site. The rough grade for the classroom building pad and parking lot is complete. They will begin footing excavation and underground utilities in the next 30 days. Grading for the firing range building pad will also begin in the next 30 days. Project remains on schedule.

**Burlington Site:** 

The ground lease has been signed the City of Burlington and received by ACC. The next step is to file the lease with the Community College System Office. State Construction is in the process of developing the design amendment for this scope of the project. Once those are in place we will work through the SCO process to bid out this component of the project.

Main, Powell & Gee Buildings – Classroom, Lab, Offices, Library Reno/ Nursing Expansion/Childcare Updates

Asbestos tile abatement continues in sections of Main Building. Electrical and plumbing rough-in is in progress as well as framing. Phase One which includes the Skills/Tutoring Center, the library and the nursing expansion are on schedule for completion in mid-May. The entire project is to be complete by the end of November.

**Bill and Nancy Covington Education Center** 

AT & T should have the fiber completely installed the week of March 11th. One addition to the project, as part of the overall Tobacco Trust Grant, the College is coordinating the installation of an animal fence for large animals on the property. This portion should be complete by summer.

Main Server Room HVAC Replacement Project No new update. The unit shows a scheduled delivery date of 3/15/2024.

**Campus Exterior Wayfinding Project** 

The Board of Trustees approved the Campus Exterior Wayfinding Project at their February 12th meeting with a total estimated budget of \$302,600. This project has been submitted to the State Board for approval at their March 15th meeting. The College is requesting the use of SCIF funds for this project. Once approved, the College will post the Request for Proposals. A second project will be brought to the ACC Board of Trustees at a future date for interior wayfinding signage as well as the addition of the Dillingham Campus.

Horticulture Technology Storage Building **Project** 

Horticulture staff have completed the move of all equipment into the new building and it is in use. Tear down and disposal of the old sheds that line the highway has been delayed due to a medical emergency with the contractor. We hope they will be able to complete this very soon.

### ADMINISTRATIVE NAMING

**POLICY** 2.2.4

Alamance Community College (ACC) seeks to recognize the efforts and contributions of individuals, families, organizations, foundations, or corporations by the naming of buildings, portions of buildings, rooms, and other spaces and features on campus. This policy establishes a uniform and consistent procedure to gain approval and to record these namings.

The primary intent of the naming process is to allow ACC to recognize significant contributions of all kinds by naming physical property, if the donor desires such recognition.

#### I. PURPOSE

This policy serves as a guideline for the ACC Board of Trustees, the Alamance Community College Foundation ("ACC Foundation") Board of Directors, other volunteers, and college employees who are involved in the solicitation of donations. It is established to assure consistency, fairness, fitting recognition, and positive value in exchange for the honor of name association with a physical aspect of ACC.

#### II. RESPONSIBILITY FOR RAISING FUNDS

The ACC Board of Trustees and the ACC President have the responsibility to ensure that the mission of the college is met. The mission of Alamance Community College is to provide the educational programs and services of a comprehensive community college that respond to our diverse community needs and empower life-long learners to participate in a global society. To successfully carry out the mission, the ACC President or designee may oversee the solicitation of public and private funds. Such efforts will be coordinated through the Office of Institutional Advancement.

#### III. NAMING TRIBUTES

Two circumstances may give rise to a naming tribute:

- 1. Naming in Recognition of Distinguished Service may honor a gift of time or talent that has had a significant positive impact on the college over an extended period of years. Such honor will typically be recommended no less than three years following the end of the individual's service to the College. The ACC President, or a committee appointed by the ACC President, is charged with determining whether the person proposed is worthy of the honor, as well as the degree of internal and external support for the proposed naming, prior to submitting to the ACC Board of Trustees, via the Budget and Finance Committee, for approval.
- 2. Provision of a monetary gift appropriate to the facility or physical aspect being named. (See Giving Levels section.)

#### IV. DONOR RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Donors to be honored with naming opportunities may reflect individuals, families, organizations, foundations, or corporations.

- 1. Naming recognition should enhance the reputation and prestige of the College and the donor. The ACC Board of Trustees reserves the right to withdraw the privilege of name association should future acts and circumstances warrant.
- 2. The donor has up to five years to fulfill the naming rights pledge.
- 3. It is the responsibility of individuals negotiating on behalf of the college to advise potential benefactors that a gift may be recognized by naming, subject to approvals and decisions consistent with this policy.
- 4. In all cases, a signed agreement with the donor should be sought that details the gift's purpose, payment schedule (where appropriate), acknowledgement and naming opportunities, fund management, and other relevant details.

#### V. GIVING LEVEL GUIDELINES

A. Giving levels for the naming of physical property should be established through consultation among the Budget and Finance Committee of the ACC Board of Trustees, the ACC Foundation Executive Committee, and the ACC President and/or designee. All potential gifts that will result in a naming will be brought to the Budget and Finance Committee of the ACC Board of Trustees by the ACC President or designee and voted on. Naming decisions involving gifts in excess of \$750,000 and those recognizing distinguished service require a vote of the ACC Board of Trustees. Naming decisions involving gifts of \$750,000 or less will be reviewed with the ACC Board of Trustees, but do not require a vote.

#### B. Buildings

The guidelines below represent naming minimums. In preparation for a specific fundraising initiative or in response to an unsolicited donation offer, the ACC President, or a committee appointed by the ACC President, will make a recommendation as to appropriate naming levels based on past precedents at ACC, comparables from other community colleges and educational institutions, institutional needs, and market conditions. Minimums indicated below may be overridden by a vote of the Building and Grounds Committee of the ACC Trustees and if the donation is over \$750,000, by the full board.

- 1. New buildings constructed with private funds: A minimum of 50% or more of the cost of construction is required to name a new building. Cost of construction includes, but is not limited to design, land acquisition, construction, and contingency expenses.
- 2. New buildings constructed with public funds: A minimum of 10% or more of the cost of construction is required to name a new building. Cost of construction includes, but is not limited to design, land acquisition, construction, and contingency expenses.
- 3. Existing buildings: Existing unnamed buildings may be named for donors in cases where substantial gifts are made by donors to programs conducted within those buildings or other appropriate purpose. The minimum amount is \$1 million.

4. <u>Major renovations</u>: In cases of major renovations which extend throughout an existing building, the building can be named for the donor provided that the donor's gift covers at least one-half (1/2) of the total cost of the major renovation (including design, construction, and contingency costs). It is not possible to outline specifically what constitute a major renovation, but this is a matter which shall be resolved in each individual case.

#### C. Spaces Within and Outside Buildings

It is not possible to create a policy that covers the myriad opportunities for naming on a college campus, including, but not limited to, halls, auditoriums, centers, student spaces, lobbies, suites, libraries, breakrooms, labs, classrooms, conference rooms, exterior features such as gardens or fountains, courtyards, plazas, specialized teaching facilities such as a greenhouse or equipment room, or parking facility.

In preparation for a specific fundraising initiative or in response to a donation offer with an unsolicited naming request, the ACC President, or a committee appointed by the ACC President, will make a recommendation as to appropriate naming levels based on past precedents at ACC, comparables from other community colleges and educational institutions, institutional needs, and market conditions. The recommended naming levels for a specific facility will be brought to the Budget and Finance Committee of the ACC Board of Trustees and the ACC Foundation Executive Committee for approval.

- D. When a College Building or other space has been named, it is the intent to continue to use the name so long as the facility remains in use and serves its original function, or as otherwise may be provided for in the written agreement between the parties and as subject to North Carolina statutes that exist now or may exist in the future. For example, the College has the right to propose a duration of a certain number of years for a particular naming opportunity, but that will be specified in the proposal to the donor by way of a memorandum of understanding that will be prepared by the Foundation Office and signed by the donor.
- E. The guidelines will be reviewed periodically by the Budget and Finance Committee of the ACC Board of Trustees, the ACC Foundation Executive Committee and the ACC President and/or designee. The donor and the ACC President or designee will jointly decide how funds donated are directed, invested, and spent, with the donor having ultimate authority if the gift is within the mission of ACC and the ACC Foundation as established by the ACC Board of Trustees and the ACC Foundation Board of Directors.

#### VI. OTHER PROVISIONS

A. Where a building or physical aspect has been named, the college will continue to use the name so long as the building, part, or facility remains in use and serves its original function, unless otherwise stipulated at the time of gift acceptance. If a named facility is destroyed due to forces of nature or when the use of a building, room, or facility is changed such that it must be demolished, substantially renovated, or rebuilt, the Budget and Finance

Committee, following the guidelines provided in the Giving Levels section, may name another comparable room or facility for the original donor or honoree.

- B. The ACC President, in consultation with the donor, the ACC Board of Trustees or the Budget and Finance Committee of the ACC Board of Trustees, the ACC Foundation Executive Committee and/or other appropriate parties shall make decisions related to naming, including but not limited to the following: public announcements, physical markers and care and maintenance of the physical markers.
- C. Commitments made prior to adoption of this policy shall be honored.

#### Alamance Community College -- Budget and Financial Information For the Month Ending February 29, 2024 Executive Summary

This report is produced for the Board of Trustees of Alamance Community College and is intended to provide both budget and financial information for the month ending February 29, 2024. This report is unadjusted and unaudited, meaning that consistencies (e.g. due to timing), transfers, and other items may still need processing for accurate comparison to prior statements. This report includes the following exhibits:

- o Exhibit A State Accounting Fund: Year-to-Date Budget Report (With Prior Year Expenditures)
- o Exhibit B County Accounting Fund: Year-to-Date Budget Report (With Prior Year Expenditures)
- o Exhibit C (NEW) Institutional Accounting Fund: Year-to-Date Budget Report (With Prior Year Expenditures)
- o Exhibit D Institutional Accounting Fund: Year-to-Date Activity Report (With Ending Balances)

#### Report highlights include:

- o <u>Budget</u>: The Feb 2024 Monthly Fiscal Update includes all allotments available to-date. Suggested Budget Amendments of \$387,454 include: State Longevity (\$220,629), Customized Training (\$27,992), Construction Bootcamp (\$25,500), Appprenticeships (19,241), an IDD Training Grant (\$194,000) and student awards(reversion of \$99,908). The \$5.5 million (previously budgeted) for a firing range was awarded by the NCCCS in Jan24.
- o Overall: At February 29, 2024, the College's fiscal year is 8 / 12th or 66.67% complete.
- Exhibit A--State Accounting Fund: The Current Expense program is higher than at this same point last year by about \$20,000 (about 0.1% increase). This spending includes a 4% wage increase for full time employees as well as about \$276,000 of non-recurring costs. Overall current expenses are 61.0% expended when compared to budget. The budget includes a special allocation of approx. \$640,000 that was awarded in FY21-22 by the State for operations, yet intended to be used as needed until FY 2023-2024. The Capital Outlay program is 6% spent, to date and is substantially budgeted to pay for operations rather than equipment purchases in FY24.
- Exhibit B—County Accounting Fund: Current expenditures were higher than at this same point last year by over \$498,000 (about 18% increase) and is 81% expended when compared to budget. The Capital Outlay program is 23% spent.
- Exhibit C—(NEW) Institutional Accounting Fund: Current expenses are vastly different than at this same point last year due to error corrections that were posted last fiscal year. Current expenses are (103%) expended when compared to budget. A budget amendment for Institutional funds will be recommended with the March finance report. In this accounting fund, both unspent current expense and unspent capital outlay monies are available to carry forward into next year.
- Exhibit D—Institutional Accounting Fund: Programs are categorized as unrestricted, restricted, proprietary, or plant. Now that FY23 has been closed, the beginning balances of each fund are final. FY24 spending of Institutional funds is \$350,000 (18\$) more than FY23.
- o <u>Negative program balances</u>: **Planned** negative balances appear in mid-year reports usually as a result of spending first, then receiving reimbursement later, such as with financial aid, grant programs, and capital projects. There are no Instititutional funds with unplanned negative balances to report.

#### Alamance Community College -- Budget and Financial Information For the Month Ending February 29, 2024 Management Analysis

#### Cash Flow:

- State: The System Office reported that tuition receipts from all colleges in the system exceed budget mid-year and college with FTE increases of at least 5% may expect an additional allocation of Excess Receipts.
- Ocounty: For the first seven months of this fiscal year, the average facility spending exceeds the monthly cash allocation of \$336,000. Due to staff turnover, some Feb invoices have not yet been paid. February costs reflect that delay in payment.
- O Institutional: No updates for Feb 2024.

#### Budget:

Ocunty Operating Funds: A budget request from ACC to Alamance County for FY25 was approved by the Board of Trustees and submitted to the County in February.

#### Grants and Other Funds:

O New Grants Budgeted in Feb 2024: Although new grants are in process, no budgets were amended for grant awards in Feb 2024.

The proposed program is intended to improve student success and completion, prepare work-ready graduates, and increase learning opportunities for students while meeting the demands of local industry partners.

Strategic Priority #2: Learn ACC will involve all students in innovative and inclusive formal and informal learning experiences that improve student success, prepare students for jobs, and provide a strong foundation for continued learning.

Implementation of the Veterinary Medical Technology program will fulfill demand from the county's employers and students.

- one of the fastest-growing occupations in the region, state, and country. The increase in pet owners and pet care expenditures from small animal veterinary care (for example, dogs and cats) and large animals for agriculture and recreation (for example, cattle, horses, and goats) drives this demand. Alamance County had 480 farms raising cattle (dairy and beef), pigs, sheep, goats, and chickens in 2017 (USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service).
- Registered Veterinary Technicians (RVTs) grew by 35. 4% in the last ten years in North Carolina—over three times the rate for the category of all occupations together, which was 10. 8%. In addition, NC ranked 8th in the nation with the highest demand for RVTs.

- The median RVT annual wage was \$37,450, which is significantly higher than the county average median wage of \$31,203.
- Student demand for the program is strong. Currently, 511
   Alamance-Burlington School System (ABSS) students are
   enrolled in Agriculture Pathway Courses and 136 in Animal
   Science in the county's Career and Technical Education
   (CTE) Career Clusters. ACC will also be able to enroll adult
   students and previous Animal Care and Management
   graduates.

ACC was awarded the Golden Leaf Community Based Grants Initiative in **February 2024** resulting in the ability to fund the proposed Veterinary Medical Technology program through construction of a barn lab environment at Covington Education Center. In order to expedite program implementation, an electronic vote was sent to the Curriculum and Instruction Committee and voting members voted unanimously to move forward with the Veterinary Medical Technology AAS program application as outlined and subsequent Career and College Promise Pathway. Veterinary Medical Technology faculty members will initially be funded via the Perkins Grant to begin work related to Program Accreditation through the Committee on Veterinary Technician Education Activities (CVTEA).

Total AAS Program Hours: 70

\*Requires NCCCS (April-May 2023) and SACSCOC (July 2023) approval. Subsequent CVTEA Program specific accreditation required.

The NC Career and College Promise (CCP) pathway allows students to gain access to a professional health science career. This CCP program pathway will increase enrollment and create a pathway toward Veterinary Medical Technology AAS degree completion. The College will work in collaboration with ABSS to provide resources and student enrollment which is predicted at 20+ students for the fall 2025 cohort.
